Infrastructure Development What will it take?

- Determine Requirements
 - Organizational Structure
 - Separation of HERS Provider and HERS Raters
 - Conflict of Interest Provisions
 - Financial Interest Provisions
 - Ownership
 - Multiple legal issues
 - Development of contracts Incorporating Regulatory issues into Rater agreements
 - Training curriculum Develop curriculum to meet the goals of the standards
 - Quality Assurance Requirements
 - Continuing Education Requirements

Roles and Responsibilities for the Provider Credibility - Responsibility

- Training by Provider must be top notch and continuing
 - Credibility is key
- Support is on-going and must not end
 - Market Actors must know they can call with questions
 - Technical
 - Marketing
 - Process
- Quality Assurance is part of credibility
- Data Management and Information flow
 - Simplicity
 - Consistency



Implementation How do you sell it?

- Create CHEERS Registry
 - Password protected internet database
 - Use of technology is critical
- Simplify programs and processes
 - 'to-do' list for Raters
- Promotion of program
- Working with Building Departments
 - Raters are considered 'special inspectors'
- Work with firms that have similar programs



Current Environment

- Nearly 300 Raters statewide
 - Over 500 building departments have at least one rater in each jurisdiction 95% of departments
- CHEERS Raters used for IOU administered Energy Star homes new construction program
- Alliances with two approved compliance software firms for electronic file transfers
- CHEERS Registry provides consistent data in XML file format
